This agreement for four machines is the only Eastern sale located in the Phoenix file. It calle for "four-Latest Improved Lombard Patent Log Hauler, equipped with new design tread chains and ten inch channel frame." Phoenix was to receive for this large order \$21,000.

This sale represents a symbolic link of Maine to the Lake States. as Stephenson and Lombard were poth Penopscot lumperman; Stephenson was a ploneer in opening the Lake States to lumbering, settlement, and industry.

With this 1915 sale the Phoenix business with Lombard steam log haulers came to an end. Probably a parts and repair business was carried on at Eau Claire for some years after this, until Phoenix itself came to an end in the 1920s.

The quantitive historian will look at this list and note that the good years for Lombard West began in 1906 and continued through 1909: four really good years. Then what happened? No other caterpillar log haulers were then on the market in the West. Investigation will probably reveal that a number of factors played a role in this decline after 1909: the big timber in the Lake States had been mostly out off; the
